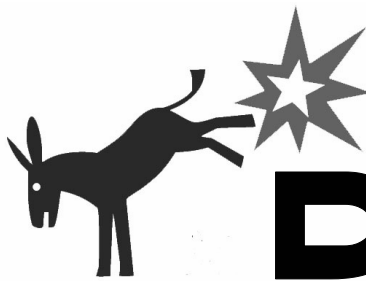

34th District Voting Members in the Running

The 34th District has been the home of some powerful people in local government, most notably since 2001 when Greg Nickels was elected Mayor of Seattle. That same year Tom Carr was elected Seattle City Attorney, and Tim Ceis was appointed Deputy Mayor. Tom Rasmussen was elected to the City Council in 2003 and no one bothered to run against him in 2007, probably because they knew they'd lose. Several of our members have served or are serving in the Burien City Council: Lucy Krakowiak, Jack Block, Jr., Stephen Lamphear, and Sue Blazak.

Some of Them Are Old Friends

This year we have endorsed six candidates from the 34th District who are running for office. Some of these are old friends. You or someone you know probably went to school with Dow Constantine or were in Boy Scouts with him, or you know his parents, or you have watched Dow grow up. He has deep roots here and it seems that everyone knows him. He was Chair of the 34th District Democrats before he was elected State Representative, and then he moved up to Senator when Greg Nickels became our King County Councilmember leaving an open position in the State Senate. Dow moved into Greg Nickels' position on the County Council when he became Mayor. Next stop: County Executive!

Tom Carr was an active member of the 34th District Democrats before he ran for Seattle City Attorney against Mark Sidran in 2001. In fact, his campaign literature had a picture of members of the 34th District Democrats standing behind him, cheering.

Sue Blazak, the present Deputy Mayor of Burien, is running for reelection for Burien City Council, Position 2. She participated in many of the early visioning meetings and continued to be involved in public planning processes, both as a citizen, and, as a member of the Burien Park Board.

And Some of Them Are New

Although **Max Vekich** has never run for office in the 34th District, he served four terms as State Representative from the 35th District. He is running for Port Commissioner against Tom Albro, a Pat Davis clone. He, along with Rob Holland, is favored by Port Reform in their campaign to clean up the Port's pollution, bring family wage jobs to King County, and put an end to waste and fraud.

In addition to his experience as a legislator, he is a supercargo marine clerk and member of the International Longshore Workers Union, so he knows the workings of the Port as well as having experience in government. His top priority is preserving and creating jobs at the Port and in the hundreds of businesses that rely on it. Max joined the 34th District Democrats in October of 2007 when he moved to High Point.



Second Vice Chair **David Ginsberg** is running for City Council Position 2 against Richard Conlin. This is David's first time running for office, and he has an impressive list of endorsements, including the 34th District Democrats and the King County Democrats, as well as several other District endorsements.

David's involvement with the 34th District Democrats began with the Obama campaign, where he was an Obama Organizing Fellow. From there, he served as a Captain for the Campaign for Change. David lives in High Point with his partner Michael and their two children Anthony and Anya.



Brian Bennett is running unopposed for Burien City Council, Position 7, so there's no question that he will be on the Burien City Council in 2010. He is a business attorney who has also served in government. He serves on the City of Burien Planning Commission and is the Chair of the Burien Shoreline Advisory Committee.

Report from KCDCC Meeting

The banner headline for the September 22 meeting would have to be the sole endorsement of Joe Mallahan for Seattle Mayor. Further endorsements in races affecting 34th District voters include Wilson Chin and Betty Patu for Seattle School Board District 7, Michael DeBell for Seattle School Board District 4, and Mike O'Brien for Seattle City Council position 8.

We unanimously recommended voting “yes” on four King County Charter measures. Three of these are essentially “housekeeping” items to repeal or amend sections of the Charter. The fourth amendment adds a section to provide additional protection to public land already owned by the County, so that such land cannot be sold or used without going through a well-defined process.

We endorsed the Seattle Housing Levy unanimously. Sign up to help with this worthy campaign!

A rally against FOX “news” and Glenn Beck was being planned for Saturday, September 26, across from Safeco Field. *No keys to the city would be awarded here!* The event, featuring Glenn Beck, was sponsored by Evergreen Foundation of Olympia, a group to *watch out for!*

We passed resolutions on: 1) using union talent in audio and video performances at Democratic events, 2) reforming health care, and 3) establishing a Seattle commission to address disability issues.

Sharon Mast, chair of the task force reviewing the 2008 caucuses to make suggestions for improvements in the process, advised us of their progress. Their report will be presented at the September 26 State Committee meeting in Walla Walla, so you will be able to check it out on line.

Dow Constantine’s campaign reported they are now focusing on the East side. They just established a new office in Bellevue. Finally, from their group, here’s my quote for the night: *“I just love Susan Hutchison. She’s so much like Sarah Palin, but without all that foreign policy experience.”* Feel free to quote this widely!

WSDCC Meeting Report

Lisa Plymate, Chris Porter, Karl DeJong, Ann Martin and I, Marcee Stone, attended the meeting in beautiful, sunny Walla Walla. The membership voted to not schedule 2010 precinct caucuses. In lieu of that, districts are encouraged to work toward meetings and platforms as they see fit for 2010. Some members felt that precinct caucuses were needed for party building in their areas, but others felt that the costs of facilities and the low turnout of a non-Presidential year would yield too little in return. Legislative district caucuses will be held on March 13, 2010, County Conventions on April 10, 2010, and the 2010 State Convention will be held in Vancouver, Washington in June. The requested fee for the convention will be \$50.

Since there are no Congressional caucuses in 2010, candidates for Congressional office will be voted on by Congressional caucus at the State Committee meeting, which will take place on January 29-30, 2010 in SeaTac. That vote will then be ratified by the state committee as a whole.

Being a member of the resolutions committee left me little time to do much else this meeting. On Friday night, we had 25 resolutions to go through, nine of them on health care. We got through most of them, but at my suggestion, we put together an ad hoc subcommittee to sort through the health care resolutions. By 11:30 that night the ad hoc group had a resolution that continued support for single payer but also included language to support a "not-for-profit public plan designed to immediately provide irrevocable universal health coverage to all Americans regardless of age, preexisting condition or ability to pay, without limits to benefits, and with adequate size and authority to negotiate prices and agreements to ensure its effectiveness."

The whole committee met on Saturday morning to put the finishing touches on this resolution, as well as take up nine more resolutions that had been submitted to us by party caucuses. The State Committee showed great confidence in our work as our package of resolutions was passed at the state committee meeting in total without discussion.

I would like to commend Dr. Lisa Plymate on her work on the King County Democrats' health care resolution and Karl DeJong for successful passage of his resolution on "Use of Union Talent in Audio, Live Performances, and Video Productions. I was unable to see Dr. Plymate's presentation to the Chairs meeting, but I heard very good things about it. I did see Karl's presentation at the resolutions committee and at the Labor caucus. He was professional, informative and passionate about his cause. The next state party event will be the Holiday Party on December 6 here in Seattle.

Open Executive Board Position: King County Committeeman Alternate

The King County Committeeman Alternate must be available to attend the fourth Tuesday meetings of the King County Democrats if the King County Committeeman cannot attend the meeting. Dorsol Plants and Michael Heavey have expressed interest in this position and we are printing a short biography to introduce them to you. This does not preclude anyone else from running. If you are interested in this position, you can ask for nomination at the October 14 meeting. This position is open to any member of the 34th District Democrats, with the one obvious requirement that the candidate be a man.

Michael Heavey is a third generation Seattleite and is proud of his family's strong ties to Seattle, King County, and Washington by in large. After years of working in the private sector, Michael joined Dow Constantine's campaign for King County Executive in May working as a Field

Organizer. The Chair of the 34th District Democrats asked Michael why he was interested in becoming the KCDCC Alternate. Here is a portion of his response:



I have had the opportunity to visit countless Democratic Legislative District meetings in past couple of months while working for Dow. The general consensus I received amongst the greater

Democratic community is that the 34th District Democrats are far and away the model which other LD's strive for. Having witnessed first hand the organizational prowess of the 34th, I am drawn to be of service in the continuance of the core principles that are dear to me and upon which our greatest democracy is founded

Hello, my name is **Dorsol Plants** and I have been a proud PCO of the 34th District for a couple of years now. I moved to Seattle after leaving the US Army in 2007, after 5 years and 2 combat deployments to Iraq. When I left, I was looking for a location that fit the same core values that I had: compassion, social conscience, and a desire to serve. I found it here and immediately began volunteering at the Beard of Life Mission and the ROOTS Young Adult shelter.



It would be the 2008 Caucus that would lead to my introduction to the 34th District, after filling the role of the PCO in leading my precinct through the caucus procedures. It would be the time and work as a PCO of the 34th and Chair of the Highland Park Action Committee that would lead to my run for Seattle City Council Position 4 this year. Though I didn't make it through the primary, I am proud of the work we accomplished and the 34th District Democrats' endorsement of my campaign. It's my hopes that I will have your support in being elected as King County Alternate and once again serve on the executive board, and continue to work tirelessly for my district

In Case You Missed Our Last Meeting. . .

The meeting was called to order a little after 7:00. After the opening remarks and approval of agenda and minutes, Chair Tim Nuse announced that last month's meeting on health care held the highest attendance ever, at least that we know of, at a meeting of the 34th District Democrats—400 people! We also enrolled nearly fifty new members.

Brian Earl, Bylaws Chair, will serve as Parliamentarian until a replacement can be found for Stephen Lamphear, who has stepped down.

An amendment to the Endorsement Rules to allow candidates to receive our endorsement who we have not yet endorsed, but who are certified for the November election, was approved by the membership. Candidates who have already been endorsed will retain their endorsements.

The first endorsement vote of the evening was for David Bloom for Seattle City Council Position 4. Dorsol Plants, who ran against David Bloom and Sally Bagshaw in the primary, made the motion for the endorsement. He was supporting Bloom because of a shared commitment to social justice. Those who spoke against his endorsement were not against David Bloom, but were concerned about keeping the sole endorsement for Sally Bagshaw, who had received more than 50% of the vote on the first ballot at the July endorsement meeting. Some people were unhappy with the number of dual endorsements in the primary. David Bloom was endorsed.

Christi Stapleton moved to endorse Mike O'Brien. She spoke in favor of him because he fully supports a woman's right to choose. On the King County Democrats' questionnaire Robert Rosencrantz gave a "qualified" answer to the questions concerning reproductive rights and abortions for poor women. Mike O'Brien did not receive the two-thirds vote needed for endorsement.

Karl de Jong moved to endorse Joe Mallahan for Mayor of Seattle. Karl ceded his time to the candidate. Sharon Maeda spoke against, saying that he is opposed to Nickels' racial justice initiative. Eileen Cody rose to speak for Mallahan and ceded her time to him so that he could answer. He said he was quoted out of context by Erica Barnett on Publicola, which, as many of us know from experience, she is prone to do. He confessed to speaking out of ignorance and explained that he had said that he was disappointed that the Mayor had fired a great community organizer, and by changing leadership in that department, he had shifted to a race and social justice agenda, but he hadn't seen the results. He wants to be clear that the social justice program is an absolutely appropriate program and he fully intends to continue it as Mayor.

Walt Creekmore then passionately spoke of anti-union activities at T-Mobile, where Mallahan is an executive on leave for this campaign.

Mallahan did not receive the two-thirds vote required and McGinn retained his sole endorsement.

Both Lloyd Hara and Bob Rosenberger were nominated for King County Assessor. Neither candidate received two-thirds

of the vote on the first ballot, so we went to a second ballot. The ballot for dual endorsement did not receive the required two-thirds of the vote. We take no position on this race.

Motions for endorsement of Betty Patu and Wilson Chin for Seattle School Board Position 7 were made. Chin received a sole endorsement.

Nominations were then made for Mary Bass and Kay Smith-Blum for Seattle School Board Position 5. Neither candidate received the required two-thirds on the first ballot; the candidates received a dual endorsement on the second ballot.

Joe Fitzgibbon moved to endorse Sue Blazak for Burien City Council Position 1. She received a sole endorsement.

We endorsed Yes on Referendum 71; Proposition 1, the Housing levy; and the fourth King County Charter Amendment, by acclamation as a block endorsement.

Joe Fitzgibbon moved to endorse Burien Transportation Benefit District 1—Vehicle License Fee, which would provide pedestrian and bicycle improvements. A hand count was called for, and the motion to endorse passed.

Due to the late hour, Tim Nuse moved to amend the agenda to postpone the election of King County Alternate to October when we will have more time.

We then discussed the District finances and how we were planning to distribute the money set aside for contributions to candidates. After deducting an amount to carry us over for the first three months of 2010, the Executive Board recommended an amount of \$7,834.34 for contributions. The original recommendation included \$1,000 for Tom Carr, but Kathy Minsch moved that we decrease that amount to \$700 on the advice of Tom Carr. Contributions to Seattle candidates are limited to certain amounts, and he cannot accept more than \$700. Kathy moved that we add the \$300 to the contribution for Dow Constantine, which passed easily. The membership approved the following:

- \$3,734 to Dow Constantine
- \$1,000 to Max Vekich
- \$700 to Tom Carr
- \$1,000 to Approve Referendum 71
- \$500 to King County Democrats
- \$250 to David Ginsberg
- \$200 to Vote Yes on the Seattle Housing Levy

The two resolutions that were printed in last month's newsletter were approved: the first, concerned a public option for health care; the second, resolved that WSDCC use union talent and technicians.

Brian Allen was appointed Acting PCO in SEA 34-1484.
